
Not many of us might be old enough to remember that the NCUK foundation programme was initially set up in 1987 to deliver a split degree programme for Malaysian governmentsponsored students.





To ensure that our students are always one step ahead, Mandarin is a compulsory subject for all students in the Early Years, Primary Years, and the Middle Years programme. PYP students will now also have their three periods Chinese classes bumped up to six periods per week.

Let's Learn Mandarin







On 8th February 2017, the annual Chinese New Year celebration was held in our campus at Fairview Subang Jaya. All our students participated actively in this event, where Chinese songs and dance were performed. Parents and guardians joined hands in a mask painting competition. The success of this event showed the achievement of FIS in promoting international-mindedness among students. FIS has been offering Mandarin as a compulsory subject. There are three phases offered for PYP students and five phases for MYP students. Students will be allocated into different phases based on their capabilities in the four strands, namely reading, writing, listening and speaking as well as viewing and presenting.

Widely Spoken Language in the World

Knowledge of more than one language enriches personal development. It helps to facilitate international-mindedness. Mandarin is one of the most widely spoken languages in the world. The increasing impact of Mandarin worldwide has become hard to stop. Therefore, to prepare our students to face the challenges of the 21st century, Mandarin is a second language in Fairview and a compulsory subject for all students.

There are three strands in learning Mandarin: a) oral language – listening and speaking; b) visual language – viewing and presenting, and c) written language – reading and writing. To address the diversity of our students' language requirements, these strands have been organised into five developmental phases with each phase building upon and complementing the previous one. Besides, in Fairview, learning Mandarin is more than learning a language. It enables the students to explore an ancient culture of the world and learn Mandarin in various inquiry-based activities.


